IRONTON ELEMENTARY PARENT INVOLVEMENT POLICY

 - (D) The carrying out of other activities, such as those described in section 1118 of the ESEA.


Ironton Elementary School will implement required school parental involvement policy components as

- * Parents of new students will receive the policy upon registering their child.

- * Parent Group meetings
- * Annual Title I meeting
