1. ARP ESSER Assurances

Items to be purchased will include: masks, sanitization supplies and equipment, hand hygiene (alcohol based hand sanitizer), signage (social distancing, mask compliance, hand washing), health screening assessment devices.

The District will utilize funding set aside from section 2001(e)(1) ARP Act to continue to invest in comprehensive afterschool programming and summer learning/enrichment for its elementary students.

- In addition to the facilities improvements identified below in Section 4, the District will also be seeking to purchase additional technology devices and associated technological equipment for its staff and students in an effort to achieve a 1-to-1 technology ratio across the District, increasing overall remote learning capabilities for students and staff. Further, the District will be purchasing one new, larger school bus, which will increase spacing capacity and allow for more social-distancing among student riders. Lastly, the District desires to make overall network connectivity improvements throughout all District facilities, to improve student and staff remote learning capabilities.

The District's Leadership Team (Superintendent, Federal Program Coordinator, Student Services Director, Principals, Maintenance Supervisor, Transportation Supervisor, and Technology Coordinator) meets frequently to seek input from all stakeholders in order to identify, prioritize, and address the needs of the district caused by COVID-19. Community input was solicited prior to finalizing the district plan for spending ARP ESSER funds. Providing for the safety of students and staff and providing for the educational needs of the students and staff during the pandemic is the basis for determining spending priorities.

The District desires to make overall network connectivity improvements throughout all District facilities, to improve student and staff remote learning capabilities.

ACCELERATION/ENRICHMENT periods for targeted learning needs, skill development, and credit recovery; (9) Implement a model for literacy across the curriculum; (10) MTSS development and implementation; (11) Implementation of evidence based instructional strategies and frameworks; (12) Expand/Enhance after school programing; (13) Focus on internal ELA/Math Interventions Employ up to 5 positions to address instructional loss, social/emotional wellbeing, or addressing underserved populations.
